Synopsis of Program: The FCD Young Scholars Program (YSP) aims to stimulate basic and policy-relevant research focused on the early education, health and well-being of immigrant children from birth to age 10, particularly those who are living in low-income families. Research areas of interest are limited to the following: factor (e.g. individual, familial, cultural, neighborhood) contributing to both positive and negative outcomes for young immigrant children in their communities and schools; individual and group identity formation among young children from a variety of groups living in different environments; the experiences of newcomer children in early education, kindergarten, and elementary school programs; language development among immigrant children; and evaluation of impact of public policies in health and in education that affect the life prospects of newcomer children. *Applicants may either be untenured ladder faculty or have received tenure within the past four years at the time of application.
