Sikhism: In a Visual Medium

John will explore the core beliefs and practices of Sikhism. With the usse of digital images, he will draw particular attention to the Sikh communities in India and the diaspora, while addressing the importance of scholarly research in the preservation of religious heritage.

Prehistoric Fishing on the California Channel Islands: Archaeological Investigation of a Maritime Culture. Illustrated Lecture by Dustin McKenzie Anthropology Dept., UC Santa Barbara Monday, November 6 7:30 p.m., Farrand Hall Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History

Fishing is the most extreme subsistence adaptation practiced by humankind – it requires significant labor and technological investment to be successful, but it entails high risk because humans are poorly adapted to aquatic environments. Even so, subsistence strategies of prehistoric peoples in our region were focused heavily on the exploitation of local fisheries. Fish increased in dietary importance through time, and were the staple food during the most recent prehistoric period. The culmination of four archaeological research projects, this presentation explores the ramifications of intensified fishing efforts, the significance of technological shifts, and how these issues affected the development Channel Island cultures.

Prof. Cynthia Shelmerdine, University of Texas, Austin The Workings of a Mycenaean State Tuesday, November 7 4 p.m. McCune Room (HSSB 6020) Sponsored by UCSB Classics and the AIA • The beautiful and rugged Santa Ynez Valley is the setting for a series of monthly hikes and nature activities open to the public each fall and spring on the 6,000-acre UCSB Sedgwick Reserve. On the second Saturday morning of each month, three interpretive hikes - ranging from easy to moderately strenuous - will be led by trained docents who will introduce you to the plant life, wildlife, landscape, and geology of this former private ranch. A fourth stroll for disabled wheelchair folks and kids in strollers will be led by a wheelchair-enabled docent. Participants are welcome to bring their own lunch to enjoy under the oaks following the hikes completion. During the hiking period, local artists are welcome to come to the Reserve for a paint out.

The hikes provide an opportunity to see and hike through this pristine property. Get up close to the Little Pine Fault, view wildflowers including the Yerba Mansa, Jewel Flower, Wild Onion, Bush Lupine, California Poppies, and many more, depending on the season and the winter rains. View all three Santa Barbara County Oaks - Valley Oak, Blue Oak and Coast Live Oak along the way.

The first hike for the 2006/2007 season is set for Saturday, November 11. Hikers should wear long pants and sturdy shoes, bring a hat, water, sunscreen, and hike snacks. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m; the hikes start promptly at 9:00 and finish about noon.
