UC Santa Barbara has been awarded \$1.5-million by the National Science Foundation to establish a pioneering research and education partnership with China in chemistry, physics, materials science, and chemical engineering. The project is formally called the Partnership for International Research and Education in Electron Chemistry and Catalysis at Interfaces, or PIRE-ECCI. Our partner

institution in China is the Dalian Institute of Chemical Physics of the Chinese Academy of Sciences, which is considered China's top institution for the study of catalysis and chemical reaction dynamics. The program begins at 8:30 a.m. and the first 90 minute-session will be devoted to general presentations about this innovative project and the role of graduate training in international technology transfer. The balance of the day will feature scientific talks on catalysis by speakers from UCSB and the Dalian Institute.
