## Reminder from Campus Fire Marshall Chris Wiesen:

GUIDELINES FOR PORTABLE ELECTRIC HEATER USAGE

Portable electric heaters constitute a potential fire hazard. Too often they are left on inadvertently, or placed on desks or shelves in the proximity of combustible items, which may result in a fire. These types of heaters can also overload building circuits, which may also cause fires. Physical Facilities, EH&S and the Campus Fire Marshal strongly discourage the use of these appliances. Physical Facilities strives to maintain proper building temperatures. If your building is too cold, please contact Physical Facilities so they can fix the problem. In the event that existing building systems cannot provide a comfortable temperature range, the use of a personal heater will be permitted after an electrical safety inspection is performed by Environmental Health and Safety. To ensure the safest use of portable heaters, please follow these guidelines:

- 1. Keep all combustible materials a minimum of 3 feet away from the heater.
- 2. Place heaters only on the floor.

3. All heaters must be UL listed and have a tip-over switch (a device which automatically turns off the power if the heater tips over).

4. The heater should be plugged directly into an electrical wall outlet without the use of an extension cord or power strip.

5. Please turn off and unplug the heater when you leave the room or the area.

Current UCSB graduate students who are or have been Teaching Assistants or Associates are eligible to develop materials or procedures which will improve the quality of instruction in undergraduate courses, and to provide the applicant with experience in developing those materials or procedures. A maximum of \$1,500 per project may be used for salaries for applicants. Additional funds may be awarded as necessary for: supplies, although minor supplies such as photocopying, paper, and printing are normally supplied by the academic department; materials; services, such as Instructional Resources media production services.
