

JOB OPPORTUNITIES

The **American Museum of Natural History** (AMNH) in New York is inviting applications for an **Assistant Curator position** (tenure track) in the Division of Anthropology. We are particularly interested in candidates whose research relates to issues of general significance in anthropology and who apply their findings to challenges confronting the modern world, especially in the face of globalization, degradation of the environment, threats to human health, political conflict, uneven resource distribution, or other problems of broad societal concern. Although candidates are invited to apply regardless of geographical interest, we are especially interested in those with expertise in Pacific/Oceania. Candidates should demonstrate a capacity to communicate effectively within their scholarly community and to a larger public. AMNH curatorships are defined as research positions: prior experience with museum collections is not a requirement, though would be considered a positive attribute. AMNH curators are expected to maintain a high level of productivity in original research, to seek extramural funding, and to assume oversight responsibility for the management of Museum collections relevant to their areas of expertise. Other duties may include serving on committees and participating in Museum-sponsored exhibits and educational programs. Candidates should have completed the Ph.D. degree before the expected employment start date (July 1, 2011). The American Museum of Natural History is committed to the principles of Affirmative Action and encourages applications from women and minority candidates. Interested candidates should submit the following materials:

a) cover letter with name, address and current position of the applicant including a description of the candidate's research interests, accomplishments, and plans.

b) list of dissertation advisors, committee members, co-authors and co-PIs on funded grants during the preceding five years.

c) detailed curriculum vitae, complete bibliography, copies of up to five relevant publications (pdf versions preferred).

d) names, positions, institutional affiliations and contact information for no more than three referees regarding the applicant's professional qualifications.

Electronic submission of all materials is strongly encouraged but materials may also be sent by mail or courier (not fax) to: Anthropology Search Committee, Division of Anthropology, American Museum of Natural History, Central Park West at 79th Street, New York, NY 10024-5192. To receive the fullest consideration, applications should be received no later than January 30, 2011.

Call for Proposals - 2010-2011 Instructional Improvement Program (IIP) Grants

The purpose of the Instructional Improvement Program is to encourage and support faculty efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate instruction. The program is supported largely by Undergraduate Instructional Improvement funds from the State Legislature and the Regents. These funds are viewed as seed money to encourage experimentation with new ideas, methods, technologies and content areas, so that the quality of undergraduate instruction at the University of California remains excellent, and like the quality of research, on the "cutting edge." The benefits of a funded project must affect more than one offering of one or more courses. IIP Proposals are due **Tuesday, February 22, 2011** by 5:00 pm.
